Exercise 01 (03 pts):

1. What is cohesion?

- The way in which an author uses sentence structure to make the text more understandable to the reader. This includes the way the sentences relate to each other. (01)
- Cohesion is a special type of glue that writers use to make more ideas stick together.
- A special type of argument used in writing.
- Cohesion introduces new ideas in a text.

2. What is coherence?

- Coherence introduces new ideas in a text that have never been discussed or introduced.
- Coherence is the sound a speech makes when it is read aloud.
- Coherence is a writer's way of making a text less understandable to the reader.
- Coherence is how easily the entire text is understood by the reader. (01)

3. Which is an example of coherence?

- Sentences which flow together and make sense written side by side. (01)
- Words which cause a reader to have to use a dictionary to understand them.
- An author paying attention to how the organization of an essay might make it more understandable to the reader.
- An author using word choices that describe an image or a scene.

 - 3- Topic sentence: come at the beginning of the paragraph; it has a topic and a controlling idea. It tells the reader what the paragraph will be about. (01)

 - The use of the past tense
 - Time and Place
 - Sensory and emotional details
